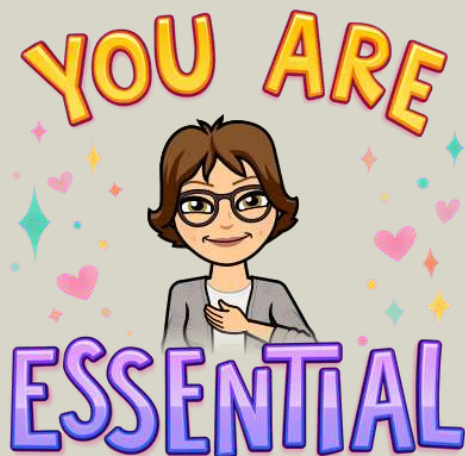
National Hospital Week

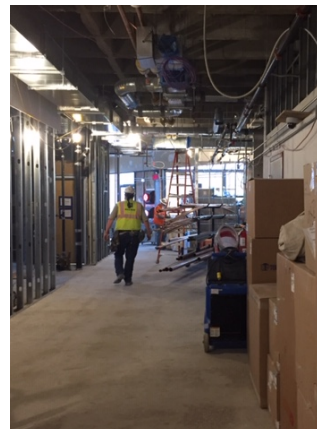
We are so grateful for this family and we thank each and every one of you for your dedication to Jennie.

Women's Services Campus Update

Families in Council Bluffs and western Iowa will have a beautiful new space to welcome their babies when the fifth floor renovation project is completed later this year. It was just a few short months ago that we "broke ground" on the Women's Services Floor. The \$10.75 million project will transform 18,000 square feet into an entire floor dedicated to women's services. A couple weeks ago I donned a hard hat and vest and inspected the progress for myself. It really has come a long way in a very short period of time. Upon completion, the women's services floor will feature:

- Six private labor rooms where moms can labor in a comfortable and soothing environment
- Three Jacuzzi tubs available for pain management
- 12 postpartum rooms for bonding with baby after delivery
- A cesarean section suite that offers moms the ability to do skin-to-skin immediately after surgery
- Four Level II NICU bays with a dedicated space for consults
- Expanded space for childbirth education, prenatal breastfeeding education and postpartum breastfeeding support
- A Safe Place infant security system
- A large waiting room area for family and friends

- A mock up of one of the Labor and Delivery Rooms
- The wall unit highlighting all of the equipment plugins/ gases needed in a Labor and Delivery Room. Panels will cover the wall when not in use.
- Nurses station which is located right in between the Labor and Delivery wing on the east hallway and the Postpartum wing on the west hallway
- Hallway off the elevators looking toward the waiting room

With surgeries placed on hold due to Covid-19, the 4th floor has been closed for almost two months. Though this is not ideal from a revenue standpoint, the silver lining from all of this is, it has allowed construction to continue at a swift pace without disruption to patients on 4th!



New Senior Vice President of Operations

We are pleased to introduce the newest member of our management team David Burd, Senior Vice President of Operations. Dave was most recently CEO of Thayer County Health Services a critical access hospital in Hebron Nebraska. Dave interviewed with multiple groups to include physicians, ancillary and nursing department managers and a group from the Health System. Interview evaluations were overwhelmingly positive with a very dominant theme of "He fits our culture..." Dave started his position at MJE on May 4th. This gives him approximately 60 to 90 days of transition, before Donna Hubbell retires. We are very excited to welcome Dave to the Jennie family. He and his family are residing in Council Bluffs.
